About the Poll

Sponsored by 1776 Foundation and Montana Public Policy Center, the Montana Pulse Survey conducts a series of public opinion polls several times per year. Each poll measures Montanans attitudes on elected officials, current policy proposals and a variety of other timely topics. The results of each poll are made available for free to the media and the general public, so that all Montanans can keep a pulse on important issues and the elected officials leading our state.

We surveyed 650 Montana voters on February 27 – March 2, 2025. We use a combination of traditional telephone survey and an online survey tool to interview randomly selected participants from a demographically diverse panel. Utilizing this methodology ensures we are able to reach voters that have abandoned landline telephones. The margin of sampling error for the sample is +/- 4 percentage points.

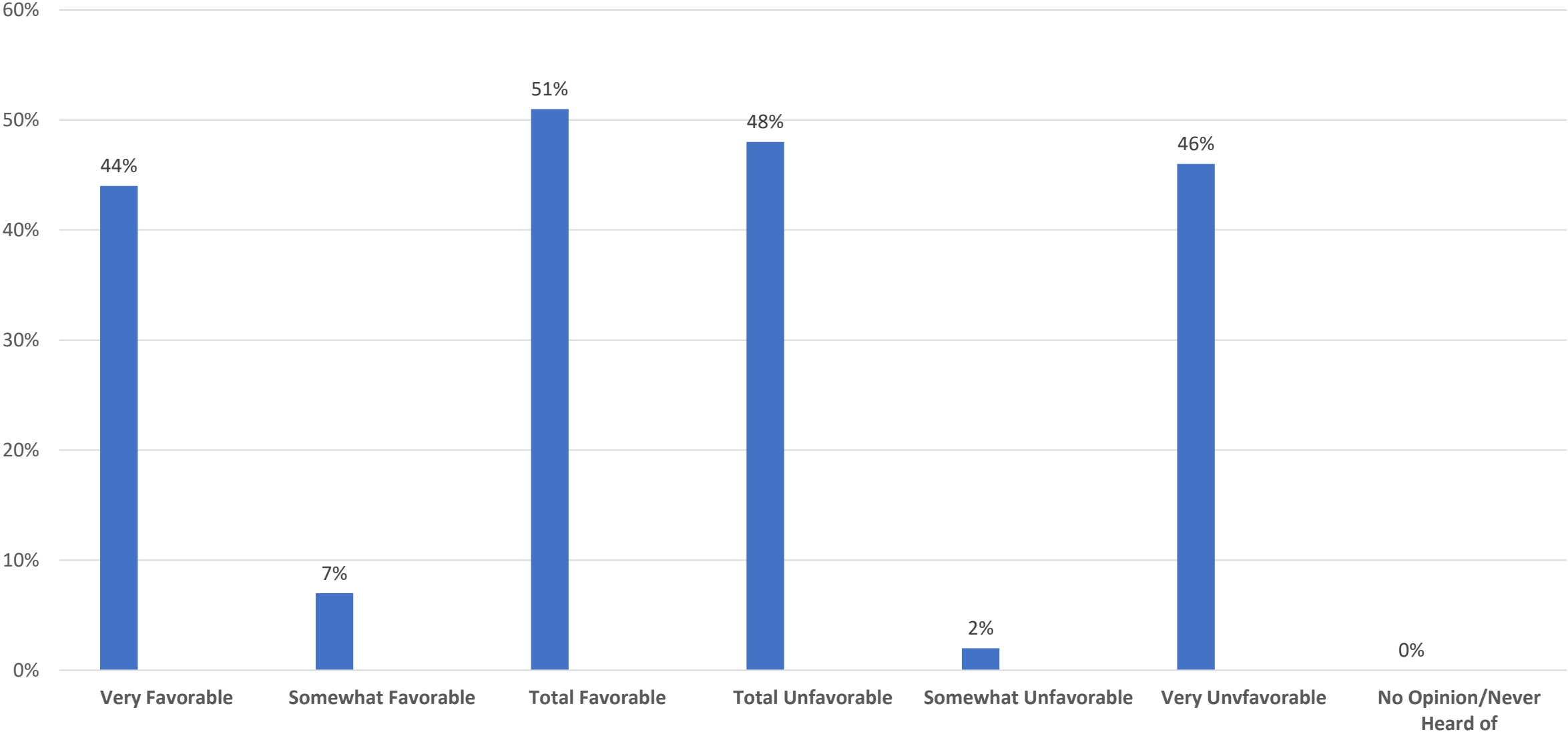

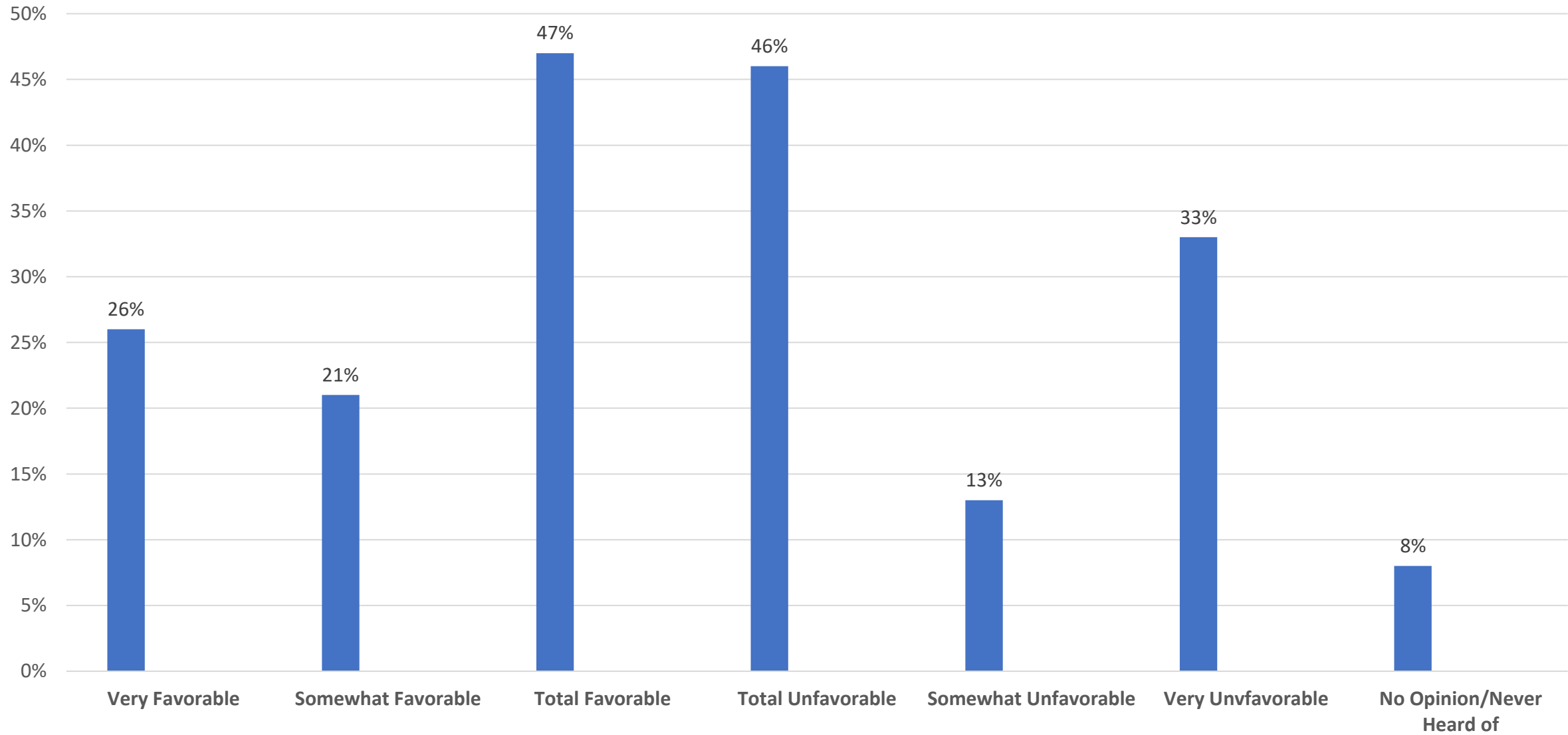

President Donald Trump Image Rating

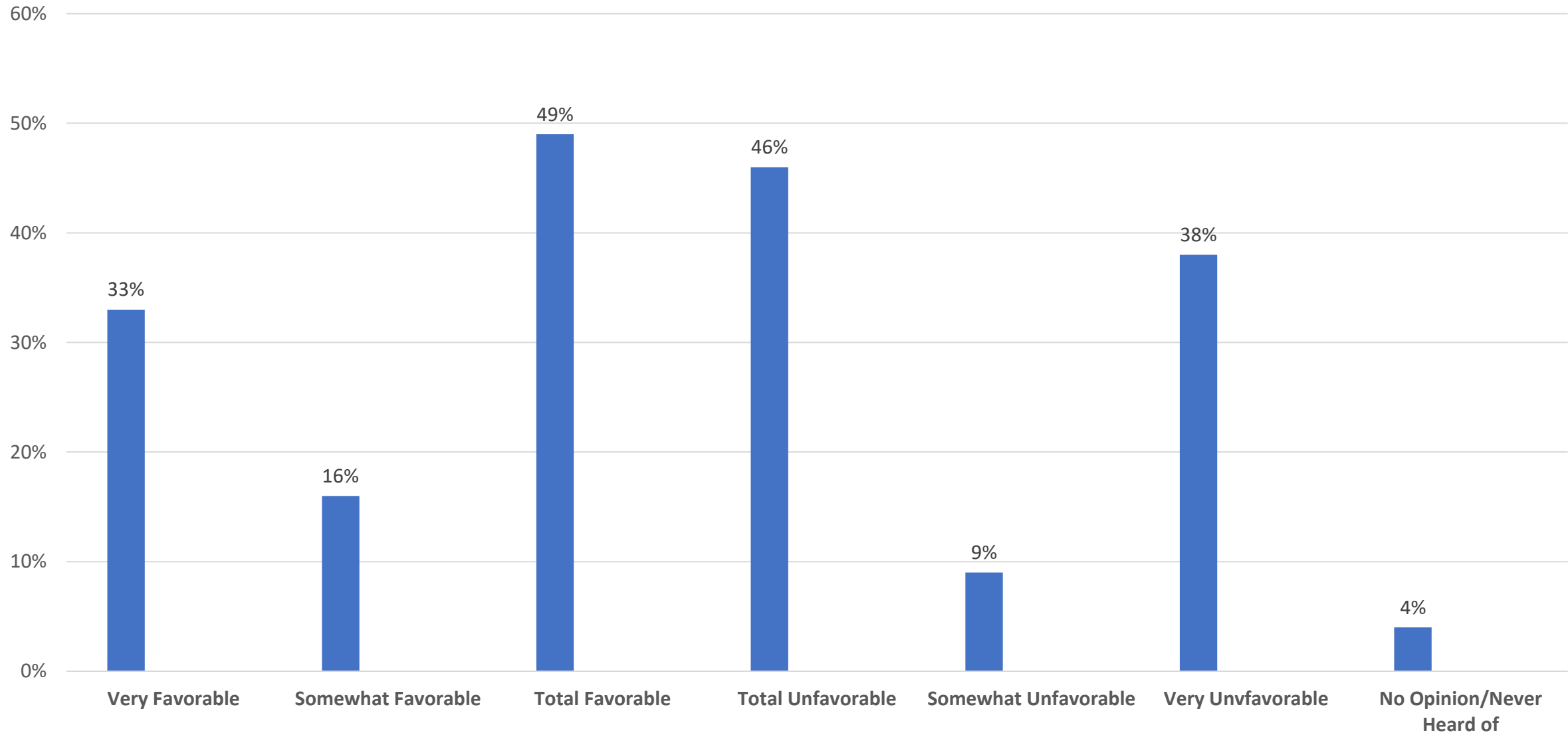

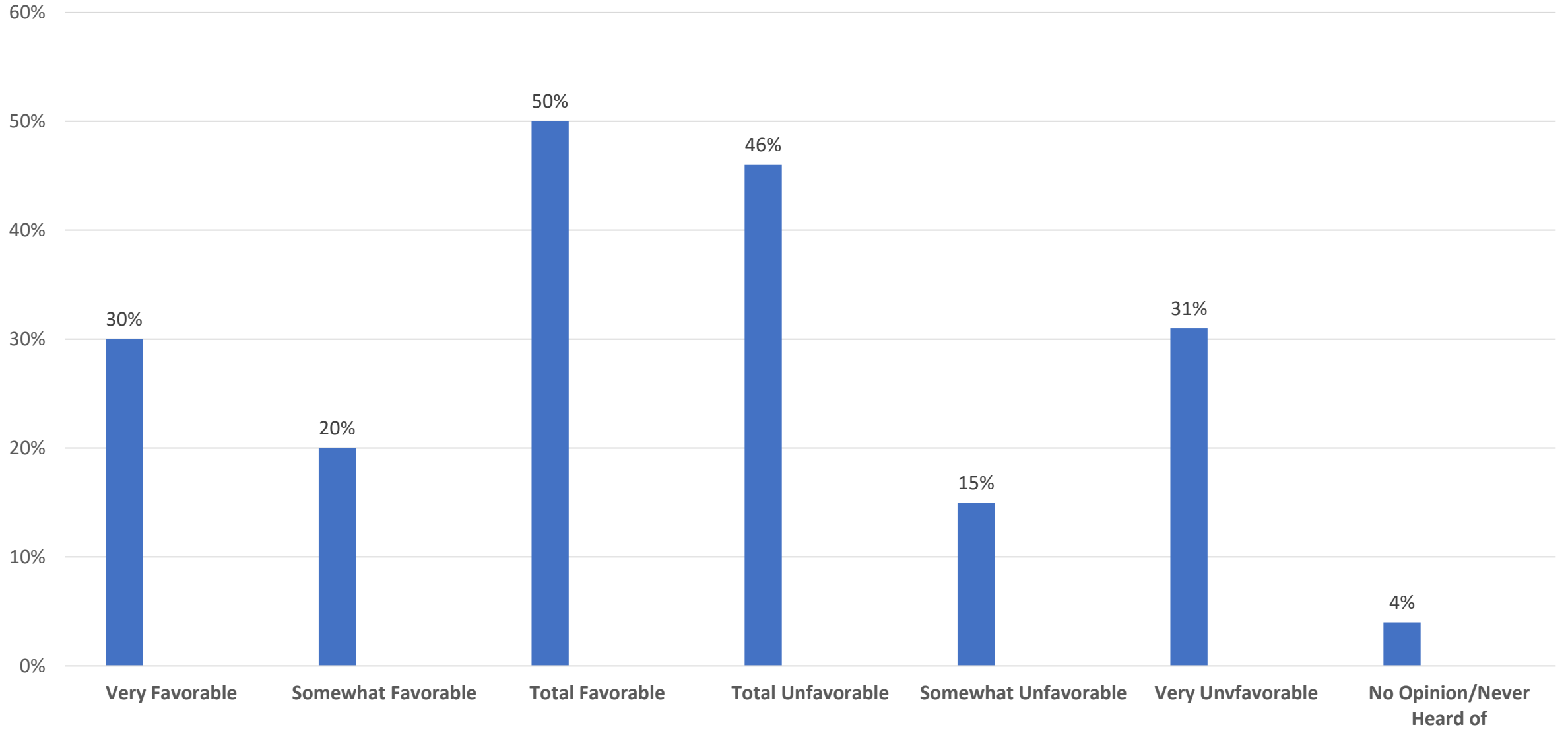
Senator Steve Daines Image Rating



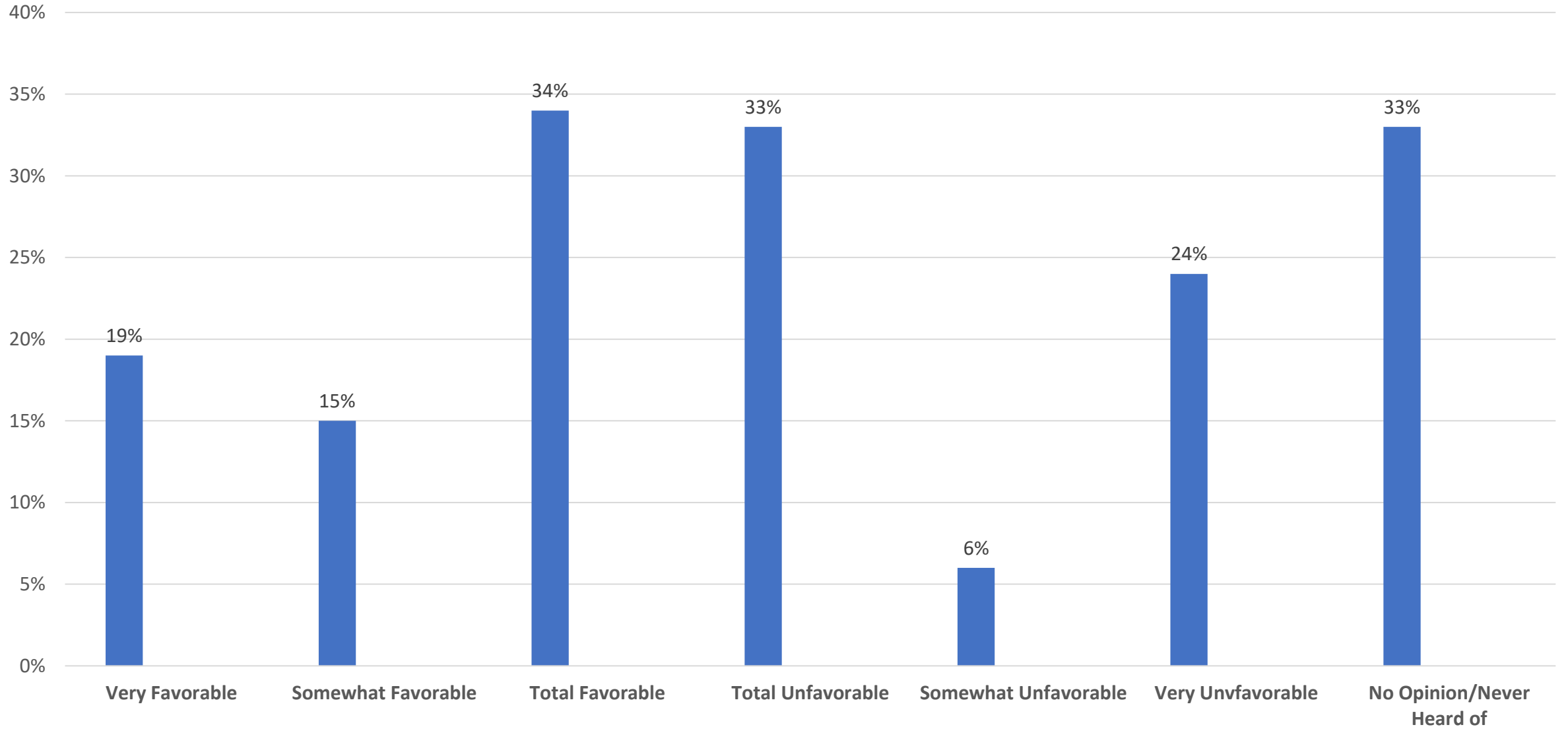
Senator Tim Sheehy Image Rating

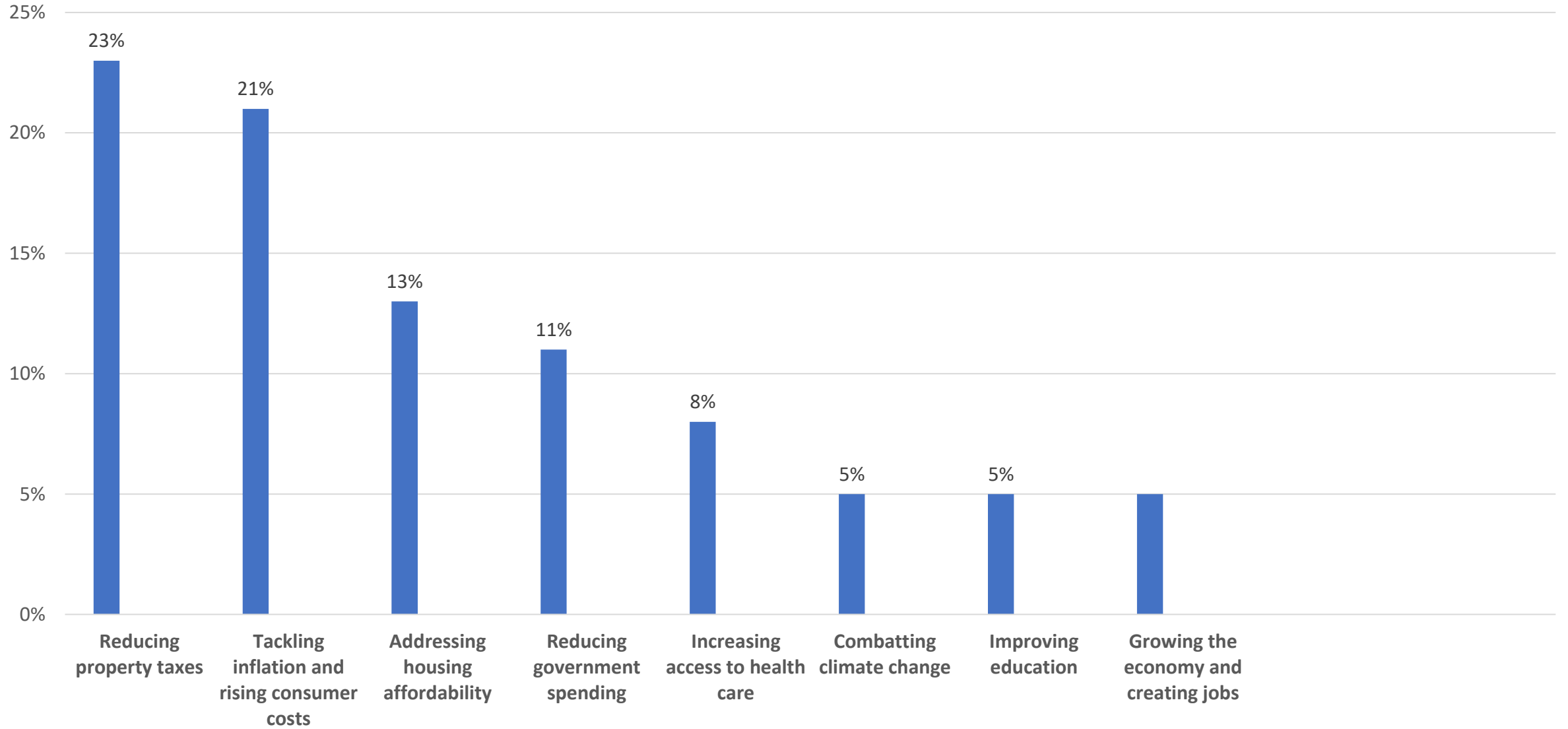


Voter Opinions of Current Issues

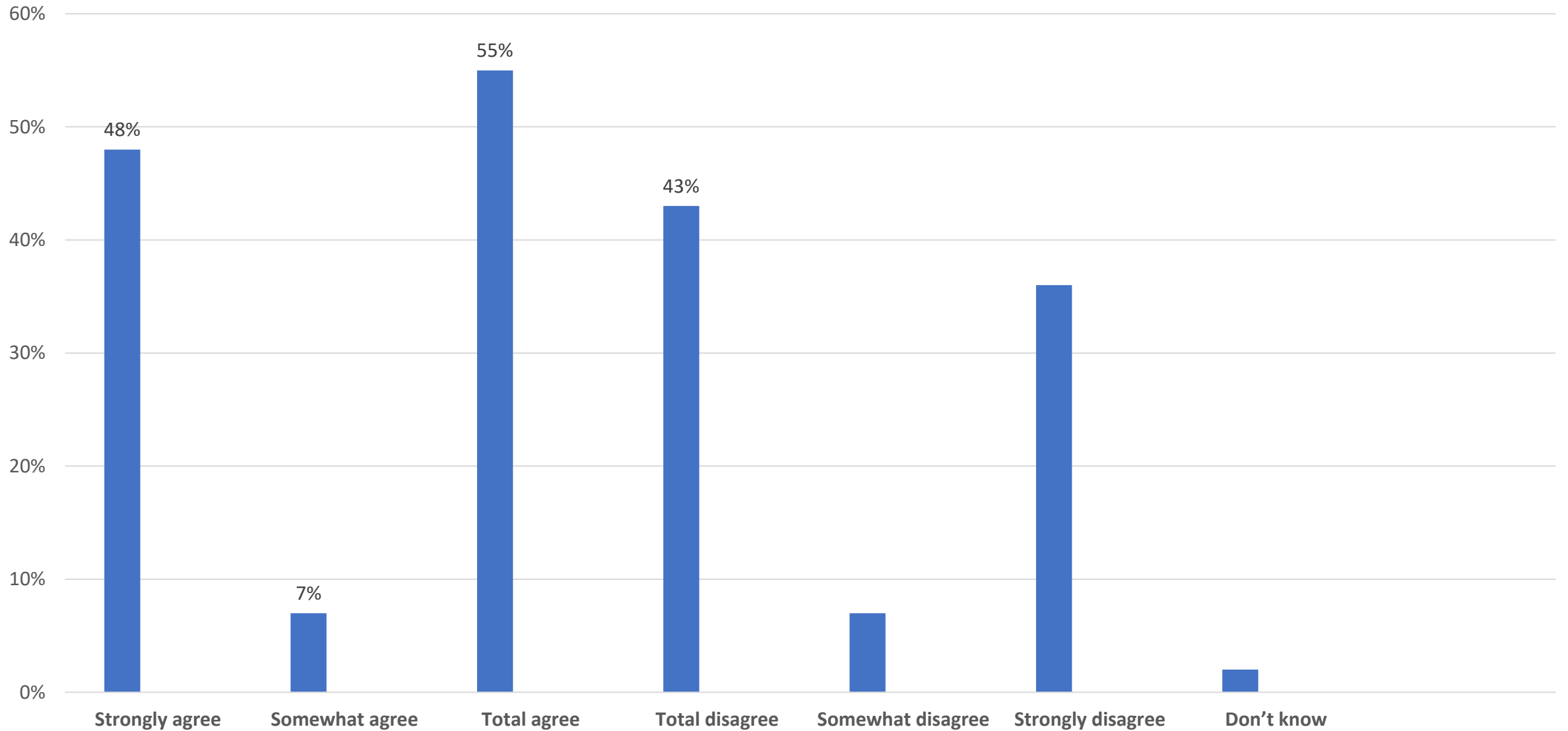
We asked voters their opinion on the following issues:
